PSPC CHURCH THEME 2025

At PSPC's 181st Anniversary Service on 8 September 2024, it was announced that having renewed our land lease for 30 years, we will prepare for a Building Renewal Project (BRP) for repair, restoration, renovation, addition and alteration of the church premises to support PSPC's ministry expansion for the next season. A BRP Steering Committee – Eld Andrew Ong (Chairman), Eld Wan Kum Tho (Vice-Chairman), Rev Darryl Chan (Pastoral Advisor), Dn Lai Kian Fong (Building Management Committee Chairman), Dn Evelyn Ng (Treasurer), Dn Benjamin Smith (Worship Committee) and Choo Wai How (Church Manager) – has been formed to (1) Enhance Cross-Functional Coordination; (2) Streamline Change Management; and (3) Facilitate Congregational Communications. The EDC is using 2025 for congregational engagement and preparations with the target to start the BRP in 2026. There will be no facilities disruption in 2025.

A. THE THEOLOGICAL VISION

Beyond the “What”, “When”, “Who”, “Where” and “How much” of the BRP is the all-important “Why”. The theological vision before us is that:

THE CHURCH IS PEOPLE AND ONLY THEN DO THE PEOPLE HAVE A BUILDING

Essentially, we want to have a “Completed Building with Church Unity”, “Renewed Building with Renewed Congregation” and “Larger Premises with Expanded Ministry”.

Therefore, 2025's church theme is “**Renewing Our Hearts, Building As One**” to implement church-wide and ministry-level initiatives to enhance **Church Unity** and **Congregational Renewal** so that PSPC will be in a good place theologically, spiritually and congregationally to start the BRP in 2026.

B. CHURCH UNITY

1. PSPC's sermon and Bible study series in the first half of 2025 will start with a topical series on "Christian Community" (January – March) and then the book of Philippians (March – June) which comprises theological themes which support what we intend to focus on.
2. Enhancing church unity right from the leadership level, the newly constituted EDC after ACM 2025 will use Peter Scazzero's "Emotionally Healthy Leadership" for the monthly Court meeting devotions.
3. Here in PSPC, the cell group is the "Key Vehicle of Discipleship, First Line of Care". Therefore, we are encouraging an increase in cell group sign-ups.

C. CONGREGATIONAL RENEWAL

1. We also announced at the 181st Anniversary Service that we have integrated our Mental-Emotional-Spiritual Health (MESH) Ministry Framework so that we can enhance: (a) Psycho-Emotional Education (Jess Goh); (b) Spiritual-Emotional Health Class (Rev Kelvin Chen); as well as (c) Spiritual Formation and Spiritual Direction (Pr Dawn Tan). We commend these seminars, classes and retreats for our mental-emotional-spiritual growth and renewal.
2. All our Generational Ministries (Sunday School, PLH, YACHT, Men's and Ladies' Ministry and Senior Members' Fellowship) will be enhancing bonding and fellowship to fulfill the church theme.

D. CONCLUSION

In a broken and fractured world, the Church of Jesus Christ has the profound calling and urgent mission to demonstrate what it means to live as one people. May this prayer from the *Book of Common Worship* be answered for the renewing of our hearts so that we can build as one.

*God, good beyond all that is good, fair beyond all that is fair,
in You is calmness, peace, and concord.
Heal the dissensions that divide us from one another
and bring us back to a unity of love
bearing some likeness to Your divine nature.
Through the embrace of love and the bonds of godly affection,

REFLECTIONS

You Are Not Alone

And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near. (Hebrews 10:24-25, ESV)

In 2023, Vivek Murthy, Joe Biden's Surgeon General, published an 81-page warning about America's "epidemic of loneliness," claiming that its negative health effects were on par with those of tobacco use and obesity. A growing number of public-health officials seem to regard loneliness as the developed world's next critical public-health issue. The United Kingdom now has a minister for loneliness. So does Japan.

Christians often find themselves in uncomfortable situations, forced to make choices in their secular workplaces that we know will dishonour God – glossing over the defects in a product in order to obtain large buy orders, giving false assurances on the longevity or functionality of the product, participating in wild company events for fear of being left out, the lists go on. Do we conform for comfort, compromise for acceptance, or remain prisoners of conscience? How do Christians maintain a "transformed mind" (Rom 12:2, 1 Jn 2:15) that recognizes its priorities lie elsewhere and accepts that his/her message and behaviour may not be welcome in every situation (Jn 15:18-19, Phil 2:15)?

Scripture Tells Us We Should Commune

Such was the situation faced by Christians in the 1st century AD and to the present day. The New Testament tells us how those early Christians coped without the benefits of the structure of organized religion and modern facilities.

The Bible's original word for "church" is ekklesia, Greek for "called-out assembly" or "gathering." This word took on the meaning of "all Christians" in some contexts and of "local gatherings of believers" in other places. When a person trusts in Jesus for salvation, he or she becomes part of the universal body of Christ (1 Corinthians 12:27). Smaller groups of believers come together in local churches to worship God, to grow in their understanding of God's Word, and to live out their lives in Christ in community.

Acts 2:42–47 reveals that the original "Christian community" was known primarily for its devotion to the apostles' teachings, to fellowship, to prayer, and to loving one another. Jesus Himself had promoted this sense of community: "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John 13:35). A Christian community is marked by the way people treat each other, and the local church should strive to model Christlike attitudes.

The Bible instructs believers on how a Christian community can love one another (1 John 4:12). Believers are called to encourage one another (Hebrews 3:13), “spur” one another to love and good works (Hebrews 10:24), serve one another (Galatians 5:13), instruct one another (Romans 15:14), honor one another (Romans 12:10), be patient with one another and forgive one another (Ephesians 4:32), bear one another’s burdens (Galatians 6:2), and speak the truth to one another (Ephesians 4:25). The local church is the place where the Christian community can put these callings into practice.

Scripture Tells Us Why We Should Commune

But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for God's own possession, to proclaim the virtues of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light. (1 Peter 2:9)

Despite our spiritual inheritance and freedom bought for us by Christ, Christians live as humans in a secular world, subject to all the distractions, temptations and harms that beset all other inhabitants of this planet. And this is before we even attempt to fulfil God’s calling to be “salt and light” (Matt 5:13-16) or be “...blameless and innocent, children of God without blemish in the midst of a crooked and twisted generation, among whom you shine as lights in the world” (Phil 2:15). No pressure, no pressure.

There are at least 4 reasons Scripture tells us why we should commune. Here, I acknowledge the succinct and helpful pastoral message by **Pr Tan Hui Ru** from Orchard Road Presbyterian Church (ORPC) on this same topic (Source: <https://orpc.sg/the-importance-of-christian-community/>). She lays it out simply and well:

“Have you ever noticed that whenever the Bible talks about believers, it uses metaphors that talk about Christians as a whole community, rather than as individuals?

- We need to be connected to the true Vine (John 15:1-8)
- We are one Body (Rom 12:4-5, 1 Cor 1:12-27, Eph 5:23)
- We are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God’s special possession (1 Pet 2:9-10)
- We are a family, a household (1 Tim 3:5, 15)

This tells us something very important – Christians are not meant to be individuals alone, but part of a community of believers. What does it mean to be part of a community of believers, and why is it important?

We gather to remind ourselves of our common identity. When we gather, we remind each other through our presence and words that *Jesus is Lord, yesterday, today, and forevermore*. It reminds us Who we are living for, and why we are living this way.

We gather to encourage each other in our daily discipleship. When we meet, share our struggles, encourage each other, pray for each other and keep each other accountable, it is easier for us to continue living out our discipleship and to persevere on our journey towards Christ-likeness. We celebrate each other's wins and help to carry each other's burdens (both spiritually and materially), but also rebuke each other when our lives show signs of turning away from God. In community, we are discipled, and we disciple others. We move each other further along towards the right, towards Christ-likeness, keeping Jesus' Second Coming in mind.

We gather to serve one another, and to serve together. When we are in community, we have the chance to serve each other – whether through hospitality, encouragement, affirmation, rebuke, teaching, worship, prayer, or other means. As we get to know each other deeply and gain an understanding of how we each struggle and what needs we each have, we are given opportunities to serve each other with every struggle and need.

We gather to know God and to make Him known. The Great Commission (Matt 28:18-20) tells us to go and make disciples of all nations. This means proclaiming Christ and making disciples of Christ, even while we follow Christ – and this needs us to know Christ deeply, and from this basis to live out our knowledge of Christ. That's where our Christian community is important once again. We need each other to help us live lives that reflect Christ so that our lives will witness to Christ before we even see a word. And Christian community is the canvas that displays the love for each other that Christ has commanded (John 13:34-35, 15:12). **As theologian Francis Schaeffer says, "Our relationship with each other is the criterion the world uses to judge whether our message is truthful—Christian community is the final apologetic."** (emphasis mine)

Scripture Tells Us How We Should Commune

The pattern of Christian Community displayed in Acts 2:42-47 is often held up as the gold standard of full commitment and engagement. In the current context, we duplicate these needful activities of Bible study, prayer, accountability, and fellowship, within small, organized groups that – in PSPC – are administered by the PSPC Cell Group Ministry (PCGM). And these groups are not cookie-cutter, head-knowledge-only gatherings of terminally-agreeable people. Yes, each group has its particular strengths and interests but the correct handling of the Word, the deep engagement in each other's lives for prayer and support, the willingness to serve others both within and without the church, these are all present and exercised biblically.

My brothers and sisters in Christ, there is increasing recognition even in the secular world that we face its perils alone to our detriment, potentially spiralling into solitude and loneliness. Christ has given us an automatic membership of His family, so let us seek out that community of Christians that will enfold us, encourage us and together be empowered to do the good works He intended for us. Find one and join it today.
